
## JOHN SWEENEY'S DIARY, 1881 - 1883

John Sweeney intermittently kept a personal diary (hand written in an old exercise book) between the years of 1881 and 1883. It was passed onto his daughter Mary Carrucan nee Sweeney who in turn passed it onto her son Jack. Jack passed it onto his sister Betty Erickson nee Carrucan who in turn passed it onto her son Tim Erickson. It is currently being looked after by Tim.





The following extracts show the sort of subsistence farming which framed the lives of the early Eltham settlers.

The diary went on with monotonous regularity. The diet was one of cutting wood, ploughing, planting or digging up potatoes, taking produce or wood to Melbourne to sell and the various special occasions when someone visited or the family visited someone. Peter Cuffley thinks that Mr Gordon was a Melbourne based person who had purchased property locally and could afford to have people working for him to improve it. He possibly got wiped out in the crash of the 1890s.

The diary also lists the cost of labour in shillings.

This was subsistence farming at its purest – nothing excess, everything done with a reason and to an end. With large families of up to 10 children, it was a continual struggle to make ends meet and put food on the table.

The diary was lent to Sweeney historian Peter Cuffley who transcribed it into electronic form and added many footnotes to clarify the document as required.

## **Preamble – by Peter Cuffley**

John Francis Sweeney the son of Thomas Sweeney and Margaret Meehan, was born on the 31st of December 1843 at 'Diamond Creek'. This does not refer to modern-day Diamond Creek, but to the general location where the creek entered the Yarra River, later called Eltham. It is believed that John was born in the original paling hut that survived at Culla Hill up to the 1950s. At the time this diary was kept, John Sweeney was in his late thirties. Clearly his life was mostly hard physical labour. Sunday was more or less a day of rest, with church in the morning which John seems to attend on an irregular basis. Sunday afternoon and evening was the time for visitors. When John writes 'evening' he mostly means afternoon, and it is only when people are clearly at Culla Hill for dinner that we know he means Sunday evening. It is clear that the 110 acres will not support a large family and that outside work for more affluent landowners is one of the keys to survival, as is cutting firewood and selling it in Melbourne. John's father, Thomas Sweeney must have also cut and sold wood, for we have a record of him tendering to supply the Eltham Police Station in 1865. We can sure that Thomas Sweeney kept pigs, poultry and milking cows. He must also have kept cattle when he leased 810 acres, and after 1855 when he had clear title to 426 acres. He is said to have grown the first wheat ground at Henry Dendy's flour mill in the 1850s. The records of the Eltham District Road Board for 1864-65 state that he has 16 acres under cultivation and 404 acres of improved pasture. The cultivation would mainly be on the rich river flats below the house. These are now a public reserve called 'Sweeneys Flats'.

With the diary finishing in August 1884, we miss the death of John's mother, Margaret Sweeney on Wednesday the 1<sup>st</sup> of October in that year. She had been suffering from cancer of the stomach which was first diagnosed at the beginning of April. John not only lost his mother, but acted as undertaker and buried her in the Eltham Cemetery. John and Ellen's last child, Kathleen, was born on the 5<sup>th</sup> of October, two days after the funeral. John had lost his father in 1867, two infant children in 1881 and two young sisters, Annie Maria in 1869 and Johanna Marion in 1872.

Note: In transcribing the diary the original spelling has been retained, with some added punctuation and spacing to improve readability. The spelling of words such as 'Baren' for barn suggests that John had something of an Irish accent, which is to be expected given his Irish parents and relatives. His wife Ellen Kenney was born in Kilkenny, Ireland, and her grandson, Pat Sweeney tells a cherished family story that illustrates her Irishness. It seems she was struggling to get her children to wear their hats. Her frustrated comment was, 'And if you didn't have hats – sure you'd want to be wearin em all the time!'

Born Wales c1804, Jones was an artist, printmaker, pharmacist and farmer. Died Eltham 27/3/1888.

This was Allottment 2 of Section 6 of 158 acres, purchased by Thomas Sweeney in 1855.

William Gordon had 90 acres to the east of Culla Hill (Allotment 9 of Section 5).

John Murray, nephew of John Francis Sweeney, lived at 'Laurel Hill', North Eltham.

Joseph Anderson Panton (1831-1913), former Gold Commissioner, had a property at Eltham.
